Wellbeing Matters Community Asset Fund

Aims/priorities:

The Fund will be awarding grants to help build VCSE organisations capacity to receive and support the health and wellbeing of social prescribing referrals from the Wellbeing Matters programme.

The Wellbeing Matters programme is a social prescribing approach where Community Connectors link people to VCSE-led community activities, groups and services to improve their health and wellbeing. This fund aims to help build and develop the capacity of these local organisations and services, creating a diverse and resilient range of destinations for Community Connectors to link individuals to.

The Wellbeing Matters Community Asset Fund is supported by Salford Integrated Care Partnership (ICP), as part of the Third Sector Fund.

Fund Priorities

Proposals for this round of funding are sought that address identified gaps in provision for Wellbeing Matters referrals. These are:

- Face-to-face befriending Proposals are welcomed from organisations that can befriend and support those who may feel lonely and isolated. This could be 1.2.1 and/or group peer support activity. Proposals supporting those of different age ranges are welcomed (18+).
- Nutrition advice and support. Proposals are welcomed from VCSE organisations with appropriate experience / qualifications to be able to provide dietary advice and support (including cooking and cooking on a budget.
- Physical activities and movement with a social focus for younger adults. Proposals for options for those aged 18-35 and/or in green spaces are welcomed.

Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme



Aims/priorities:	The Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme makes grants
	towards the VAT incurred in maintenance and repairs to listed
	buildings that are primarily used for public worship, or which are
	listed places of worship owned by, or under the authority of, a
	number of specified organisations that look after redundant
	places of worship. The scheme applies to listed places of
	worship of all religions and faith groups throughout the UK.
Who can apply?	The scheme applies to listed buildings that are mainly used as a
	place of public worship. To be eligible, the place of worship
	must be listed with the relevant statutory listing agency (Historic
	England, CADW, Historic Scotland or Northern Ireland
	Environment Agency). The listing must be in force when the
	works are undertaken.
Grant amount:	The minimum value of invoices (excluding VAT) for any one
	claim to the scheme is £1,000. An application may comprise a
	number of smaller invoices, but each claim must apply to works
	that are eligible under the scheme and together generate
	combined invoice values of no less than £1,000 excluding VAT.
