

Big Lottery Fund basics



- Biggest distributor of lottery good cause money
- Distribute funds through a range of programmes

Big Lottery Fund outcomes



Outcome 1: People having better chances in life, with better access to training and development to improve their life skills

Outcome 2: Stronger communities, with more active citizens, working together to tackle their problems

Outcome 3: Improved rural and urban environments, which communities are better able to access and enjoy

Outcome 4: Healthier and more active people and communities


What do we mean by an outcomes funder?

Awards for All



Awards for All



- £300 £10,000
- New activity and projects*
- 12 months to spend grant
- Not for running costs
- Simple application form
- Up to £10,000 in any 12 month period

What can Awards for All pay for?



Examples of what a grant can pay for:

- equipment hire or purchase
- information technology equipment
- building and refurbishment work
- sessional workers
- training
- updating equipment and premises for health and safety reasons
- volunteer expenses
- transport costs
- venue hire

Awards for All cannot pay for:

Examples of what a grant can't pay for:



- Activities that happen or start before BIG pays the grant
- Day to day running costs including salaries, routine repairs and maintenance
- Existing activities and repeat or regular events*
- Items that mainly benefit an individual

- Building and refurbishment work costing more than £25,000 (including VAT)
- Fundraising activities
- Activities which promote politics or religion
- Used vehicles

Who can apply to Awards for All?

You can apply if you are a:

- voluntary and community organisation
- school
- parish or town council
- health body

You can't apply if you are a:

- individual or sole trader
- private profit-making organisation
- statutory organisation other than those listed above
- organisation not established in the UK



You can apply if...



You have:

- at least 3 unrelated people on your governing body
- a UK bank account in the name of your organisation with at least two unrelated signatories

You can:

- send BIG an application at least three months before your project is planned to start
- complete your project within one year of when BIG confirms your award

Two/Three stage application process

- Stage 1: Outline proposal form
- Stage 2: Full application
- Stage 3:

Reaching Communities (Revenue Funding)



- £10,000+ revenue funding
- 1-5 years funding
- NO Maximum project cost
- Up to £100,000 capital funding
- outcomes focused
- Timescale 8-10 months

Reaching Communities-Buildings Strand



- £100,000+ Capital funding + associated revenue costs
- 1-5 years funding (2 years for building work)
- Multi-purpose building
- Eligible areas (postcode checker on website)
- <u>NO</u> Maximum project cost
- <u>Three</u> stage process (12-16months)







BBC Children in Need

"BBC Children in Need's vision is that every child in UK has a safe, happy and secure childhood and the chance to reach their potential"

ESSENTIALS... Children & Young People Must Be:

18 years and Under & Living in the UK 'IN NEED'

- Illness / Distress / Neglect / Abuse
- Any Kind of Disability
- Behaviour or Psychological Difficulties
 - Living in Poverty / Deprivation



WHO Do We Fund?

- Not For Profit Organisations Which Have:
 - A Constitution or Governing Document
 - A Management Committee
 - A Bank Account with 2 Unrelated Cheque Signatories
 - Annual Accounts
 - A Written Child Protection Policy



What Do We Fund?

- Revenue and capital, salaries, sessional staff, training, volunteer expenses, travel costs, venue hire, equipment.
- Projects including:
- Youth Clubs
- Holiday Playschemes
- Mentoring/befriending
- Play opportunities support
- Afterschool clubs

Arts activities

Outdoor play

Play groups Family

Sports activities

We Do Not Fund

- Retrospective Funding
- Relief Of Statutory Responsibility (including projects taking place within school hours)
- Applications from local government or NHS bodies
- Medical Research Or Pregnancy Advice
- Projects Unable To Start Within 12 Months
- Promotion of Any Religion
- Trips abroad
- General awareness raising
- Bursaries, sponsored places, fees or equivalent

We Do **Not** Fund

- Individuals
- Distribution to another/other organisation for example a PTA applying on behalf of a school.
- General appeal or endowment funds
- Deficit funding or repayment of loans



Child Focus

- We only fund child-focused projects
- The project/service should have clear positive outcomes for the child
- Important to involve children in developing planning and evaluating the project
- If you're seeking funding for a salary, the post should be focussed on delivering outcomes for disadvantaged children for at least 70% of the time

Safeguarding

- Organisations must provide evidence that they will protect children and young people while in their care and support them to develop
- Organisations must have their own Child Protection Policy and Procedures which everyone including children and young people know and use in their day to day work.
- Appropriate checks need to be made for all staff, volunteers and management committee working directly with - or with access to children and young people or information about children and young people

Safeguarding

- All staff, volunteers and management committee members receive child protection training which is relevant to their role and updated on a regular basis.
- Organisations must take appropriate steps to ensure that children in their care are safe eg by conducting risk assessments for activities, by ensuring supervisory staff hold relevant qualifications and providing adequate training to volunteers.

The Application Process

There Are 2 Grant Programmes:

Small Grants
Up to £10,000 – One year Only
Main Grants

Over £10,000 per year – Maximum 3 years

Applicants can only apply to one of the grant programmes within a 12 month period

The Application Process Small Grants

Application Deadline	What Happens Next	Decision
1 March1 June1 September1 December	If the application is eligible the applicant and nominated referee will need to be available during the month following the deadline	April August October February



The Application Process Main Grants

Application Deadline	What Happens Next	Decision
15 January 15 May 15 September	There is an Initial Application Process If successful the initial brief application will proceed to the next stage within two weeks The applicant will then be invited to submit a full application within one month	Mid June October February

The Application Process

Online applications only

Save your application and return to it later – saves for 120 days

Quick and easy

Online form and an assessment phone call – equally important

Groups who already hold a grant will be contacted to discuss continuation funding.

4-Step Guide to Developing an Application

- Provide a Description of Disadvantage Using Children in Need Guidelines
- Consider How the Type of Disadvantage Affects the Lives of the Children/Young People
- Demonstrate the Need For Your Project (How Does it Address the Disadvantage?)
- Describe the Positive Differences You Aim to Achieve

Common Reasons for Failure

- Missing Information
- Insufficient Evidence of Disadvantage
- Project Not Sufficiently Focused on Children
- The Majority of Young People are Aged 18 & Over
- Capacity The Organisation Does Not Have Management Skills/Experience/Finance
- Project focussed on awareness raising
- Project delivered in school time
- Competition Higher Request Amount = Higher Standard Expected



- Must have evidence of previous evaluation for expansion/improvement of an existing service
- Deliver in Salford for Salford people






Must demonstrate Social Value

The social, economic and environmental difference your funded project has made to Salford residents

Eg, local employment, local purchasing, local volunteering, recycling, ethical purchasing.





1) Give brief overview of your organisation include who are your main beneficiaries and types of activity or work you deliver.





- 2) What do you want the money for? What areas of improvement and expansion?(link to the health priorities)
- Give details of what your project will be doing and tell us the story of how the money will be spent
- What is the improvement you are making to your work and/or how are you expanding on work you have previously delivered?





3) What evidence do you have to show you have evaluated your work and are building on the success of it and any lessons learned?





4)What difference will it make to the health and wellbeing of people in Salford?

Outcomes

The change the benefit or learning that happens as a result of your work/activity.

Include how you will demonstrate social value.



5) How will you ensure continuous improvement and high quality in your service delivery?





6) What is your sustainability strategy for the piece of work you are asking us to fund?





Output

The activities, services and products provided by an organisation

Outcome

The changes, benefits, learning or other effects that happen as a result of services and activities provided by an organisation

- Who and how many people will benefit from your project
- What actual difference are you trying to make?
- How will you know if you have been successful?
- What are the long term changes and impact of your project?
