Who can apply?	<p>VCSE organisations who are: <u>full members</u> of Salford CVS</p>

Paul Hamlyn Foundation - Arts Access and Participation Fund		
Aims/priorities:	<p>The aim of the Access and Participation Fund is to support change in the way the arts are created, presented, accessed and experienced so that a wider and more diverse group of people have access to quality artistic practice, both as audiences and participants.</p> <p>The funding will cover work that involves any of the following: crafts, dance, design, digital arts and media, film, literature (including creative writing and poetry), music, opera, photography, theatre, the visual arts, and cross-arts practices.</p> <p>The funding can be used in one or more of the following ways:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Support which underpins specific programmes of work • Support for core costs • Support to adapt existing work to new contexts or to test new ways of working. 	
Who can apply?	<p>Not-for-profit, formally constituted organisations in the UK are eligible to apply. Priority will be given to organisations that are led by, and work that is developed and delivered with (including as artists and or practitioners), people who are most affected by systemic oppression and or discrimination. This means Black, Asian and other groups who experience racism, Deaf, disabled and neurodiverse people who experience the effects of ableism, those who identify as sitting at the intersections of several minoritized identities, and people experiencing poverty. It is unlikely that newly registered organisations that have yet to produce independently audited/examined accounts will be funded, and it is recommended that they speak to a Grants Manager first.</p>	

Grant amount:	Grants of between £30,000 and £400,000 for activity lasting between 12 months and 4 years with an option to extend for a further period. Most grants are in the £60,000 to £250,000 range.
Application process:	There is a two-stage application process. The Foundation aims to reach a final decision on applications within four months of receipt of stage 1 applications. The guidance notes, sample application form and the online application form are available from the Paul Hamlyn Foundation website.
Deadline:	There are no deadlines. Applications can be made at any time.

Aims/priorities:	<p>The aim of the Foundation is to support Christian charities working with art and healing and those seeking to offer social inclusion. The Foundation awards grants for projects (including projects abroad) that address the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Healing• Arts• Social inclusion <p>Applications for capital or revenue funding will be considered. Grants for building work will only be considered in exceptional circumstances.</p>
Who can apply?	<p>Registered charities in the United Kingdom are eligible to apply. The trustees look favourably on organisations whose boards demonstrate equal opportunities.</p>
Grant amount:	<p>Grants of up to £10,000 per year are available. The Trust does not normally give grants to the same project for more than three years.</p>
Application process:	<p>Application forms are available to complete online or can be downloaded from the Foundation's website and submitted via email or post. Applicants should note that the Foundation do not have the resources to enter into correspondence about applications and that all of the relevant information is contained on the Foundation's website.</p>
Deadline:	<p>Applications are considered twice a year at meetings usually held in April and October. The application deadlines for consideration at these meetings are 31 January and 31 July respectively.</p>

<p>Enterprise Development Programme - Black and Minoritised Communities</p>	
<p>Aims/priorities:</p>	<p>The Enterprise Development Programme aims to provide business and financial support to charities and social enterprises in England that are thinking of exploring new enterprise models and require financial or business support to make the transition, with the ultimate aim of taking on social investment in the future. The programme is open to organisations working across a range of sectors, which will vary as the programme runs its course.</p> <p>Currently applications are invited from organisations working in the following sectors:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Youth. • Mental health. • Equality. • Black and minoritised communities
<p>Who can apply?</p>	<p>Applications are accepted from not-for-profit organisations working with Black and minoritised communities in the Humber and Yorkshire, London, the Midlands, the North West or South West of England. To be eligible, applicants must be a legally constituted charity, voluntary sector organisation, or social enterprise which:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Has a minimum of 70% of the board of trustees and at least 51% of senior staff from a Black, Asian or minority ethnic background. • Has a clear social mission. • Distributes less than 50% of post-tax profits and reinvests at least 51% of surpluses into pursuing its social mission. • Has a constitutional or contractual lock on its social mission, dividend and surplus distribution policy (also known as an asset lock).

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Has been operating as a registered company/charity for at least two years. • Can evidence current trading activities, which require support/development, or commitment from senior management and the Board to pilot/test a coherent trading idea. • Can demonstrate evidence of trading or is actively looking to diversify and grow income through trading. • Has the staff capacity and support of the board of trustees to engage fully with the programme. • Can commit to playing an active part in contributing to the shared learning within the enterprise movement network.
Grant amount:	Up to £30,000.
Application process:	<p>There is a two-stage application process:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Stage 1 application forms ask applicants to explain their organisation's mission, provide details about their leadership and provide a top-line explanation on their proposed trading activity. • Successful Stage 1 applicants will be invited to complete a Stage 2 application. <p>Online application forms can be accessed on the Enterprise Development Programme website</p>

<p>Aims/priorities:</p>	<p>The Foundation is an adult-focussed funder, not for specific work with children or young people. The aim of the programme is to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Proactively work towards building better community cohesion and trust, and encouraging respect and understanding in the local area • Proactively promote the inclusion of marginalised groups and individuals in the life of the local community • Fund work which breaks down barriers and tensions in the local community thereby reducing feelings of division and “them and us”. <p>Funding is available for projects working with the following beneficiary groups –</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Asylum seekers and refugees (but not groups working with a single nationality) • Gypsies and Travellers • Migrant communities • Offenders and ex-offenders • Older people • People experiencing mental health problems • People experiencing violence or abuse

<p>Grant amount:</p>	<p>The Foundation makes single grants, or grants split over two or three years. One-off grants of between £500 and £15,000 are available. The average grant is between £5,000 and £6,000.</p>

	Grants repeated for more than one year vary from around £500 per annum up to £5,000 per annum, for a maximum of three years. Grants may be used for start-up, core or project costs

Grant amount:	Funding is at the discretion of the Trustees. The Foundation has limited funding available and there is strong competition for grants.

Grant amount:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • £10,000 to £60,000 for up to two years (maximum £30,000 per year) for registered charities or educational establishments. • £10,000 to £20,000 for up to two years (maximum £10,000 per year) for organisations which are not registered charities or educational establishments. <p>For registered charities and education establishments, annual grant payments cannot exceed 50% of an organisation's three-year average income.</p>

<p>Aims/priorities:</p>	<p>Grants from £100 - £750 are available for faith organisations to run activities that will support people from the communities of identity or experience below that may struggle to achieve higher levels of mental wellbeing. The communities we want to reach in year 3 are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Carers • People from BAME communities • People living with long term physical or mental health conditions • People who identify as LGBTQ+ • Disabled people • Military veterans • People who are unemployed • Socially isolated older people
<p>Who can apply?</p>	<p>You must be a constituted not-for-profit faith organisation operating in Greater Manchester for the benefit of Greater Manchester residents (also includes Glossop). A faith organisation is one whose primary function is the delivery of religious activity.</p>
<p>Grant amount:</p>	<p>£100 - £750</p>
<p>Application process:</p>	<p>If you have not previously done so, you need to register on the GMCVO website before you can apply.</p>

<p>Aims/priorities:</p>	<p>The aim of the Hope Beyond grants programme is to enable churches and Christian charities to meet changing needs within their communities as the longer-term impact of the coronavirus/COVID-19 crisis becomes clearer.</p> <p>The funding is for innovative, impactful projects that will enable people, organisations and communities to flourish in life after lockdown, building resilience and encouraging hope.</p> <p>Projects that address at least one of the following three key themes are eligible:</p> <p>Projects responding to the issues of loneliness and isolation exacerbated by the coronavirus/COVID-19 pandemic where new and/or enhanced support is being proposed. This could include enabling improved accessibility to buildings/activities and measures to ensure buildings are coronavirus/COVID-19 safe.</p> <p>Projects focused on growing community resilience and promoting mental and emotional health and wellbeing, including the provision of mental health and wellbeing support groups and 1:1 counselling for people of all ages (including clergy).</p> <p>Projects focused on growing technological capability and resilience, particularly increasing digital capacity and provision, and supporting those without online access to get online through training and support.</p>
<p>Who can apply?</p>	<p>Churches, cathedrals and Christian denominational bodies, and Christian charities</p>
<p>Grant amount:</p>	<p>Grants of up to £50,000 are available.</p>
<p>Application process:</p>	<p>The online application form, guidance documents and FAQs can be found on the Trust's website.</p>
<p>Deadline:</p>	<p>There is no deadline. Applications will be accepted on a rolling basis until all the funding has been allocated.</p>

<p>Tesco Community Grants</p>	
<p>Aims/priorities:</p>	<p>Funding is aimed at projects that focus on supporting children and families and those groups that address food insecurity. This could be for example a local school needing food for a children’s breakfast club, a voluntary organisation working with families to run holiday clubs, a charity supporting young people with specialist advice to manage mental health, a brownie or scout group needing new tents or a youth sports club needing new equipment, a family advice centre wanting to recruit more volunteers, or a local friends of a park group wanting to develop a new toddler area.</p> <p>The funding is for projects that are ready to be delivered, but it will not cover retrospective costs (already committed or spent) such as design fees, planning permissions costs or community consultation.</p>
<p>Who can apply?</p>	<p>Not-for-profit organisations in the UK can apply if they are constituted and have a governing document.</p>
<p>Grant amount:</p>	<p>Three projects in 575 local communities are voted on by customers in Tesco stores throughout the UK, with projects changing every three months.</p> <p>Three levels of grants are awarded with projects receiving:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • First place (the most votes in its area) - a grant of up to £1,500. • Second place - a grant of up £1,000. • Third place - a grant of up to £500.
