# Paul Hamlyn Foundation - Arts Access and Participation Fund



### Aims/priorities:

The aim of the Access and Participation Fund is to support change in the way the arts are created, presented, accessed and experienced so that a wider and more diverse group of people have access to quality artistic practice, both as audiences and participants.

The funding will cover work that involves any of the following: crafts, dance, design, digital arts and media, film, literature (including creative writing and poetry), music, opera, photography, theatre, the visual arts, and cross-arts practices. The funding can be used in one or more of the following ways:

- Support which underpins specific programmes of work
- Support for core costs
- Support to adapt existing work to new contexts or to test new ways of working.

#### Who can apply?

Not-for-profit, formally constituted organisations in the UK are eligible to apply. Priority will be given to organisations that are led by, and work that is developed and delivered with (including as artists and or practitioners), people who are most affected by systemic oppression and or discrimination. This means Black, Asian and other groups who experience racism, Deaf, disabled and neurodiverse people who experience the effects of ableism, those who identify as sitting at the intersections of several minoritized identities, and people experiencing poverty. It is unlikely that newly registered organisations that have yet to produce independently audited/examined accounts will be funded, and it is recommended that they speak to a Grants Manager first.

Grant amount:	Grants of between £30,000 and £400,000 for activity lasting	
	between 12 months and 4 years with an option to extend for a	
	further period. Most grants are in the £60,000 to £250,000	
	range.	
Application process:	There is a two-stage application process. The Foundation aims	
	to reach a final decision on applications within four months of	
	receipt of stage 1 applications. The guidance notes, sample	
	application form and the online application form are available	
	from the Paul Hamlyn Foundation website.

# **Enterprise Development Programme - Black and Minoritised Communities**



#### Aims/priorities:

The Enterprise Development Programme aims to provide business and financial support to charities and social enterprises in England that are thinking of exploring new enterprise models and require financial or business support to make the transition, with the ultimate aim of taking on social investment in the future. The programme is open to organisations working across a range of sectors, which will vary as the programme runs its course.

Currently applications are invited from organisations working in the following sectors:

- Youth.
- Mental health.
- Equality.
- Black and minoritised communities

### Who can apply?

Applications are accepted from not-for-profit organisations working with Black and minoritised communities in the Humber and Yorkshire, London, the Midlands, the North West or South West of England. To be eligible, applicants must be a legally constituted charity, voluntary sector organisation, or social enterprise which:

- Has a minimum of 70% of the board of trustees and at least 51% of senior staff from a Black, Asian or minority ethnic background.
- Has a clear social mission.
- Distributes less than 50% of post-tax profits and reinvests at least 51% of surpluses into pursuing its social mission.
- Has a constitutional or contractual lock on its social mission, dividend and surplus distribution policy (also known as an asset lock).

### **Community Grants Tesco Community Grants** Aims/priorities: Funding is aimed at projects that focus on supporting children and families and those groups that address food insecurity. This could be for example a local school needing food for a children's breakfast club, a voluntary organisation working with families to run holiday clubs, a charity supporting young people with specialist advice to manage mental health, a brownie or scout group needing new tents or a youth sports club needing new equipment, a family advice centre wanting to recruit more volunteers, or a local friends of a park group wanting to develop a new toddler area. The funding is for projects that are ready to be delivered, but it will not cover retrospective costs (already committed or spent) such as design fees, planning permissions costs or community consultation. Who can apply? Not-for-profit organisations in the UK can apply if they are constituted and have a governing document. **Grant amount:** Three projects in 575 local communities are voted on by customers in Tesco stores throughout the UK, with projects changing every three months. Three levels of grants are awarded with projects receiving: First place (the most votes in its area) - a grant of up to
