Five grants will be awarded across the five health neighbourhoods in Salford (Broughton; Eccles and Irlam; Ordsall and Claremont; Walkden and Little Hulton; and Swinton).

Henry Smith Charity – Holiday Grants for	
Children	
Aims/priorities:	The Charity aims to provide children aged 13 years or younger
	who are disadvantaged, disabled or from areas of high
	deprivation with a short recreational holiday or outing they
	would not otherwise have the opportunity to experience.

Funding is not available for the following:

Trips outside of the UK.

Trips to theme parks, sports events or similar high-cost attractions.

Trips for children over the age of 13 years.

Trips with a focus on education rather than fun.

Museum, cultural or theatre trips to meet curriculum requirements.

Trips for families.

Trips for individual children.

Organisations that provide children's holidays.

The running costs of play or holiday schemes - this includes funding towards an organisation's regular planned activities.

Trips that have already taken place.

Organisations with an income of expenditure of over £2 million (unless a school).

Applications can be made for grants towards a single trip, which could be a day trip or a longer residential of up to seven days in length. This could be to a countryside or city location but must be outside the children's immediate locality. Day trips should not involve a disproportionate amount of time spent travelling.

The funders will consider trips which are more local but these should have an emphasis on providing a new experience for the children and broadening their horizons. Examples include camping, trips to adventure activity centres or the seaside.

The funders will sometimes consider applications for groups of children living in deprived circumstances within more affluent areas. In this case, it is essential that the need for support is clearly explained.

Grants are only available to support children who are aged 13 and under.

Who can apply?

.Schools, youth groups, not-for-profit organisations and charities in the UK are eligible to apply.

	Priority will be given to projects that will benefit disadvantaged
	and disabled children in the most deprived areas in the UK.
	This means areas that fall within the bottom 20% according to
	the National Indices of Deprivation. For groups of children with
	disabilities, more flexibility will be given regarding the level of
	deprivation.
Grant amount:	One-off grants of between £500 and £2,750 are available.
	Match funding may be required as the Charity may not be able
	to award successful applicants the full amount requested.

Respond to one or more of the funding priorities of the7stars foundation.

Address a lack of provision (due to a lack of funding from alternative sources).

Provide immediate support, not just in the short-term but with long-term benefits too.

Shine Bright funding for registered charities to purchase items and resources to protect and support the children they serve through the cost of living crisis.

Direct grants funding to individuals affected by the Foundation's priorities, supported by outreach/social/care workers or legal professionals. (Applications must be submitted by the supporting professional/organisation.)

Urban Tree Challen	ge Fund
Aims/priorities:	The Urban Tree Challenge Fund (UTCF) was first developed in
	response to the Government's commitment to provide millions

of pounds for planting both large and small trees in and around England's towns and cities.

Urban trees are said to offer a range of benefits, including temperature moderation, flood risk mitigation, and improved wellbeing – particularly when in close proximity to large populations. The UTCF will contribute to delivering these benefits through the targeted planting thousands of large and small trees and in urban and peri-urban areas.

The UTCF supports planting of large 'standard' trees and street trees – making an immediate impact to communities and ensuring other organisations who provide planting for smaller trees can continue to do so.

Round 5 of the fund aims to level-up access to nature across the country, planting trees in socially deprived urban areas with low canopy cover, in proximity to healthcare and educational facilities.

The support is being offered on a competitive basis, targeting projects providing the greatest environmental, social and economic benefits to towns and cities across the country.

The UTCF provides capital funding to plant and establish trees that are an appropriate size for the setting in which they are planted; be it a street tree or a small community woodland.

Grants will fund the planting of trees and the first three years of their care to ensure they can flourish into the future.

Who can apply?

Applications will be accepted from public bodies, community groups, charities and non-government organisations, individuals and private companies in England.

The applicant must have full management control over the land or signed consent from those with management control over the land. Agents are also able to apply on behalf of an organisation or landowner.

Land included in a UTCF application must fall within an urban area of England. An urban area, as defined for the purposes of

	the UTCF, is a built up area (based on Office of National
	Statistics data) with a population of at least 2,000 people, with a
	buffer of 1km to account for peri-urban planting.
Grant amount:	The Fund will now provide 80% funding of standard costs for
	planting large trees and their establishment costs for three years
	following planting.
	There is a minimum application value of £10,000.
	Applications received from 1 July 2023 onward can only
	schedule tree planting to take place in 2024/25, the last year of
	the fund.
	UTCF will only require 20% match-funding by the recipient in
	either money or labour.

The IEA will be carried out by a team of independent energy assessors who will work with successful applicants to help identify energy-saving opportunities in their building. In addition, those who qualify may apply for a capital grant which can be used to install capital energy efficiency measures, identified in the applicant's IEA, to reduce their building's energy costs and support the delivery of their frontline services.

Who can apply?

To be eligible for an **Independent Energy**

Assessment, applicants must be:

A single applicant with charitable, benevolent or philanthropic purposes. If the organisation distributes surpluses to individuals such as members or shareholders, they must have an asset lock and reinvest a minimum of 51% into charitable, benevolent, or philanthropic purposes. In addition, the organisation must have one of the following legal structures/statuses:

Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO)

Community Benefit Society (CBS)

Trust

Unincorporated Association

Co-operative society

Community Interest Company (CIC)

Company Limited by Guarantee (CLG)

Company Limited by Shares (CLS)

Based and operating in England.

Delivering frontline services or managing a building as a hub that delivers multiple frontline services.

Able to evidence a need for energy efficiency support.

Financially sustainable, and likely to continue operating for at least the next two years.

Able to upload their organisation's governance document, last set of annual accounts and, if available, their building's energy bills from 1 October 2022 to 30 September 2023.

To be eligible for a **Capital Grant** (in addition to the above), applicants must:

Have been operating for at least two years.

Have an existing IEA that identifies capital energy efficiency measures, includes potential cost savings, has been completed within the past two years and was conducted by a qualified and experienced independent energy assessor.

Provide evidence that the energy efficiency measure(s) being requested will enhance their financial resilience and support the delivery of their frontline services.

Have a long-term arrangement with their premises, either owning the building or having a minimum of two years left on their lease and be able to provide documents evidencing this. If they have a lease, have the building owner's permission to carry out the capital works and they must complete the Building Owners Permission Form.

The scheme's intended outcome is to support diverse organisation types and ensure a good geographic and demographic spread of funding, so these are also factors that will be considered during assessment.

Capital Grants can be used to install capital energy efficiency measures, identified in the applicant's IEA, to reduce their building's energy costs and support the delivery of their frontline services.

The funding is to be used to help improve the energy efficiency of the building and could support, for example:

Building fabric enhancements - wall, roof or floor insulation/draft-proofing, and windows and doors (efficient glazing and thermal doors), green or cool roofs, dynamic glass and phase-change materials, lowering of ceilings (especially if in conjunction with installing PCM/lighting upgrades).

Space and water heating measures - efficient boiler/heating (HVAC improvements), heating controls, point of use water heaters, smart building management systems, heated water low-flow fixtures, Heat Recovery Ventilation systems, Ductless Mini-Split Systems, Combined Heat and Power (CHP) Systems,

Voltage optimisation, Radiant heat emitters, passive or lowenergy cooling. Lighting - LED lighting systems, light fittings, lighting controls and occupancy sensors, daylight harvesting systems. Renewable energy measures - heat pumps, solar panels, wind turbines, Micro-Hydro Systems, battery storage. Fossil fuel measures by exception and only in the event that they have been particularly recommended for the premises as part of the IEA, with limited other options available. Other capital measures by exception and recognised as proven to make significant reductions in energy. Minor capital works required to support the installation of energy efficiency measures may also be covered, but will be assessed on a case-by-case basis **Grant amount:** A total of £25.5 million is available. The scheme offers: Free independent energy assessments Option of capital grants of between £2,000 and £150,000 All funds must be spent and projects completed by March 2025. **Application process:** The guidance notes, frequently asked questions and eligibility checker can be found on the Groundwork UK website. The first step in the application process is for groups to use the online eligibility checker to see if they are eligible to apply for the cost and delivery of an Independent Energy Assessment (IEA). Those who are successful will be matched up with an independent energy assessor who will assess the building and help identify energy-saving opportunities. Applications for IEAs are currently open with notification of decisions within 15 working days. Groups are encouraged to apply as early as they can to ensure their independent energy assessment is completed and satisfactory, and they have sufficient time if they decide to apply for a Capital Grant.
