




How are councils expected to cope after 2020?

Child protection would rely only on income from local business rates and council tax.

For the poorest areas, already hit hardest by the cuts, this means even more pressure on local people and businesses and dangerous compromises in children's care and protection.



Wealthier areas, less impacted by cuts and able to raise more from local businesses and council taxes, will find it comparatively easier to continue protecting their children.






42nd Street – Young People and participation – A brief history – 39 years

How does the city of Salford empowers their young people.

How Salford Empower Young People.

The city of Salford and Salford City Council helps empower young people by allowing them to hold positions of influence. They do this by supporting Salford Youth Council and the work they do.

The City Council also empowers young people by allowing them to hold events where they can question city leaders, meet with city leaders and also take over Salford City Council for a day.

The city of Salford helps empower young people by offering them opportunities to criticize departments, that deal with young people, and offer feedback for services and act on the feedback they receive.

The city council also support young people by offering them any assistance they may need. This could be a venue, staff or equipment.

The city of Salford helps support the empowerment of young people by attending any events young people hold and show that the work they are doing isn't going un-noticed.

Roles young people hold

Member fo Youth Parliament

A member of Youth Parliament is a young person, aged 11 - 18, who represents the young people of a town or city at numerous meetings all across the city, county and country. They also meet in Parliament once a year and attend meetings within the region of their Local Authority.

Young Mayor of Salford.

A Young Mayor is a young person, aged 11 - 18 or 21 (If disabled), who represents the young people of a town or city to the local council and helps advise the city council on matters relating to young people.

Youth Councillor

A Youth Councillor is a young person, aged 11 - 18 or 21(If disabled), who represents a schol/area or youth group.




